PROPOSED NEW RULE(s)	
<i>Rule(s) number(s) and wording of new proposed rule(s).</i>	<b>CDE 9. Jumps</b>  a) The maximum distances for One Stride Doubles are: <b>9.5 metres (31 feet)</b> for horses 8.5 metres (27 feet) for ponies over 138cm and not exceeding 148cm 7.5 metres (24 feet) for ponies not exceeding 138cm
RATIONALE

Also note any circumstances or events which may have prompted this remit.</i>	The style of hunter jumping has changed a lot over the last decade, and horses are no longer at a gallop in hunter rounds, rather a forward canter instead. Doubles set at 33 feet tend to cause some dangerous jumping within the double, and there is a possibility of a serious accident occurring if this distance is not reduced
